

NJ511

NJ511 is a free phone and web service that consolidates traffic and transportation information into a one-stop resource for commuters and motorists in New Jersey.

NJ511 provides up-to-the-minute traffic conditions and is available seven days a week, 365 days a

year. In the year 2000, the Federal **Communications Commission** (FCC) designated 511 as the national travel information telephone number. Traffic and travel information offered on the N.J511 website (www.nj.gov/transportation/ commuter/511/web.shtm) and via the telephone service, is managed by a partnership of public agencies led by the New Jersey Department of Transportation, New Jersey Turnpike Authority, New Jersey State Police, and the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey. Additional information is provided by traffic monitoring devices such as traffic cameras and travel time sensors. Local law enforcement agencies, fire departments and emergency medical technicians also contribute information for the

NJ511 system.

NJ511 provides motorists with information about accidents, incidents, and unusual delays on Interstate and State highways, the New Jersey Turnpike and the Garden State Parkway. In addition, **NJ511** broadcasts Amber alerts and other emergency messages.

NJ511 greatly benefits motorists and commuters. By using **NJ511**, motorists can make informed decisions about planning trips, alternate routes and departure times. This improves individual drivers' trips and helps reduce congestion and improve safety on state highways.

Have You Gotten Your Flu Shot

Of all the age groups, those individuals older than 84 have the highest risk of dying from complications from the flu; those older than 74 have the second highest risk.

A flu shot reduces hospitalization by about 70% and death by about 85% among older adults who do not live in nursing homes. This is according to the National Institute on Aging.

The CDC recommends that older adults and senior citizens also get the pneumococcal vaccine. This shot helps prevent bacterial pneumonia in older adults. And it can be given at the same time the flu shot is given.

Antivirus 2009

There's a fake antivirus program on the web called Antivirus 2009. It's not only infecting computers, but Web sites. It will gain access to a site and then spread to users who visit that site. It will also change the site so it gets better search results and appears under searches for antivirus software and virus removal.

If you think that results in theoretical and abstruse sciences have no effect on our lives, consider these examples:
(1) Some years ago, results of experimentation with subatomic particles (that is, things that are smaller than the size of an atom) gave results that could be explained only by the existence of "anti-matter", that is, by matter that behaves like ordinary matter but causes mutual destruction when the two come into contact.
Eventually scientists were able to detect such matter directly, and the anti- electron, dubbed the "positron" (which has a positive electrical charge, whereas the electron has a negative charge) is used today in medical imaging. You have probably heard of "PET" scans, and might even have had one. Well, "PET" stands for "Positron-Emission Tomography".
(2) When scientists invented a device that emits "coherent" light, and dubbed it the "laser" (for "light amplification by stimulated emission of radiation"), they predicted that it would ultimately be useful. Skeptics, however, said that it was "a solution in search of a problem".
Today, lasers are at the heart of CD and DVD players, and are also used in several kinds of surgery, particularly surgery inside the eye. Their use makes it possible to treat conditions that were previously untreatable.
(3) Your newsletter editor has used a principle derived in theoretical mathematics, to decode encrypted documents.
(4) "Imaginary numbers" (the square roots of negative numbers), thought originally to have no connection with the real world, are used today in the analysis of many processes in Electrical Engineering and Physics.
(5, maybe) Recently, astronomers began to notice that the motions of stars and other distant objects cannot be explained by the gravitational influence of other visible objects. They postulated the existence of "dark matter" which is invisible to us as yet, but which occupies far more of the universe than does visible matter. Someday dark matter might be captured and used for human purposes. Who knows?
